TRUSTEES REPORT FOR THE YEAR TO 31 JULY 2013

1

Paisley Art Institute (PAI) is a charitable unincorporated organisation. Our purpose, as recorded in our constitution, is the encouragement and promotion of Art by means of classes, lectures, exhibitions, the purchase of works of art or literature or by such other means which the committee determines appropriate.

Events

At the AGM in October 2012, President Michael Durning and Vice-President Eslyn Barr were re-elected Tom Allan ARBS PAI becoming a Convenor for Sculpture. Paisley Art Institute Secretary Lindsay Neil BA(Hons) BFA and Hon. Treasurer May Byrne BA remained in the roles. Cara Broadley BA(Hons) M.Res stood down as membership Secretary to concentrate on her PHD, she was replaced by Irene McCann who has served on the committee for a number of years. New member were elected to the Committee of Management Euan MacGregor BA(Hons) and Lindsey MacLachlan LL.B (Hons) was a co-opted to the committee.

The PAI Annual Exhibition took place in May 2013 and was open to any artist who wished to submit work. There were 750 works submitted and of those 414 were exhibited 30 more hung than 2012. There were approximately 3,000 visitors to the exhibition, including of 350 guests to the Private View and 250 guests at our Corporate Evening. Royal Scottish Academician Duncan Shanks RSA RSW RGI accepted our invitation to be Guest Painter and Tom McKendrick RSW RGI as Guest Sculptor.

To promote interest and partnership within business and academic communities PAI hosted a Corporate Evening and a Private View for artists and interested members of the public. Twenty four awards were presented to artists this year; five of those were new awards. One was a new celebratory prize contributed by the PAI Diploma body themselves, an amazing £1000. For those awards not chosen by the sponsors themselves, Sheriff Neil Douglas, Gordon Mitchell RSA, RSW, RGI artist and former convenor of the Royal Glasgow Institute of Fine Art and Alastair Auld DA, retired Director of Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum were invited to act as external assessors to award the remainder of the prizes.

As always, all awards were open to all exhibitors and there were no age restrictions. The exhibition was promoted by a bespoke colour poster and catalogue featuring the artwork of Duncan Shanks RSA RSW RGI and a full media advertisement and editorial campaign.

As 2013 was a celebratory year we organised a special exhibition "Paisley Art Institute – Past and Present" to mark the occasion of the 125th Annual Exhibition. We asked the members of the PAI Diploma Body to select, from the Paisley Art Institute Collection and the Paisley Museum Collection, work of which they had admired to hang along with their own. What emerged from their selection gave a strong 1950's/60's feel where the PAI's had chosen the works of artists who they had a close personal connection.

Some artist were influenced or had been taught by significant characters of the previous generation in Scottish art. What emerged was a rich vein of history and lineage of excellence going back through the generations to the most important artists and artistic events in Scottish art history. A wealth of previously unknown testimony and personal connection were displayed with the paintings. We would like to pursue this aspect of our history with further projects and research. In renewing our connections with illustrious members of the Institute we invited the great-grandson of Sir John Lavery, The Lord Sempill, to join the Honorary Committee of Management. The Provost honoured the occasion of the 125th Annual Exhibition with Civic Hospitality for the opening of the Past and Present Exhibition.

PAI organised a Schools' Art Competition which ran with the Annual Exhibition and Past and Present Exhibition, showing all levels of indigenous talent of Renfrewshire from the emerging generation and of those departed; the competition was open to all schools in Renfrewshire. This year the Renfrewshire Schools Competition was opened by Cpl David Timmins QGM who's portrait was featured in the annual exhibition.

There were other large schools competitions earlier in the academic year (Royal Bank of Scotland being one) also engaging Art Departments through the Curriculum for Excellence this resulted in 4 schools participating. The competition attracted several sponsors, the Macfarlane Trust, new sponsor, artist David Smith RSW and Artstore; 10 prizes altogether. The competition was judged by the President and prizes were awarded to the participating schools. All competition entries were exhibited during the run of the Annual Exhibition.

A series of lunchtime talks was organised during the Annual Exhibition. Artist, writer and retired Director of Glasgow School of Art, Dugald Cameron OBE, who spoke on the Art of Engineering and 42 years at Glasgow School of Art. Charles Anderson RSW talked on "Bringing Art To the People, 35 years of Public Art". Sculpture Convenor, Tom Allan ARBS PAI presented 'A Tour of the Sculptures in the Exhibition'. Jonathan Macdonald MA, the Institute's art historian presented another popular "Painting Walk". All of the talks were most interesting and informative and well attended.

Continuing programme of financial probity we are constantly looking at ways to cut costs and administration. Postal cost of is an increasingly large expenditure. Following the successful implementation we are continuing at a new label format to bring in for the Annual Exhibition. Artists submitting work can fill out their labels and down load them from the PAI website keeping down costs in post, printing, to ensure legibility and cut administration. Artists can continue to use the older method by ordering labels and sending a stamped SAE.

A proposal was made by the Committee of Management to purchase a new hanging system for the Sculpture Court as the older rod system allowed paintings to slide and was painful to use. A new system was deemed not to be required by the museum as the present one was suited to heavier paintings.

This year, during the Annual Exhibition, the Committee continued last years fund raising event, the sale of small works donated by artists. This proved to be as successful as last year and was enthusiastically supported by PAI members and the public, raising approximately £3000. In all the Paisley Art Institute's events this year received in excess of 5600 visitors.

Planning for the 2014, 126th Annual Exhibition is underway. Our Guest Artists have accepted our invitation, Will MacLean RSA MBE, Emeritus Professor of Duncan of Jordan College of Art, Dundee and Sculptor Tim Pomeroy, former tutor at Gray's School of Art, Aberdeen. Being a proponent of the box construction, MacLean's work strides the artistic disciplines, addressing issues affecting culture fishing communities and the Gaeltacht. Tim Pomeroy who lives on the Isle of Arran uses the its islands rich archaeology as a subject matter.

Reserves Policy

The trustee's policy is to maintain sufficient reserves to cover a minimum of three months expenditure, excluding exhibition costs and artists payments. Exhibition costs are met from commissions on exhibition painting sales and artists payments are only payable on those exhibition sales completed and paid.

Grants Policy

The charity does not make grants. Awards are made annually on the basis of judging panel recommendations, for various categories of art. Many of these awards are sponsor funded.

Risk Statement

The trustees actively consider the risks to which the charity is exposed and where possible and appropriate take such actions as are necessary to mitigate those risks.

REPORT BY THE INDEPENDENT EXAMINER

I report on the accounts of the Charity for the year ended 31 July 2013 which are set out on pages 4 to 9.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

Basis of independent examiner's statement
