The purpose of the Institute, as recorded in the Constitution dated November 2016, is the encouragement and the promotion of Art by means of exhibitions and occasional lectures, meetings and demonstration classes, and the purchase of works of art or literature or by any other means which the committee determines appropriate.

The Charity's Committee of Management formally meets five times per year and includes the post holders of President, Vice Presidents (2), Secretary, Membership Secretary and Honorary Treasurer. Informal or extraordinary meetings may be arranged throughout the year.

Activities 2019/2020

The Trustees began the financial year with the significant organisation of the 131st Annual Exhibition. The exhibition was held in a large retail unit in the Piazza Shopping Centre, Paisley. This was the first year of activity outside of Paisley Museum & Art Galleries which were closed for a four-year programme of refurbishment. The former Co-op retail premises were secured by agreement from Edinburgh Printmakers, from early July through to October 2019. The footprint of the Piazza unit lay on the original grounds of the Government School of Design (1836) where the PAI was formed in 1876. It was most fitting to mark the history of the origin of PAI and reference to this was made in the catalogue of the show with a historic photograph provided by Renfrewshire Council's Heritage Centre.

The exhibition ran from 5th September to 24 October 2019 and received 8,823 visitors. From 600 submissions of work 467 artists were selected. The massive shop unit of some 330sqm was fitted out with exhibition flats kindly donated by RGI and the technical build and lighting was supported by Renfrewshire Leisure's technical team. Additionally, Renfrewshire Leisure donated £16,000 to the staffing costs to run the venue. A Front of House and Sales team of 14 people were hired over the 7 week run. The success of the exhibition was marked not only by a very large footfall but also the highest sales income in its history with over £36,629 in artwork, programme and postcard sales.

The exhibition featured the work of visiting artist John Walter who installed a digital participation artwork of a virtual reality, re-imagined Paisley landscape. This VR headset work attracted many young people and families keen to try out this new innovative medium.

The 131st annual attracted a large number of prize donors and support was also garnered from RGI, The Piazza, Edinburgh Printmakers, Renfrewshire Council, Renfrewshire Leisure, Paisley First and the Edinburgh Fringe Festival.

By March 2020 the Institute like many other charities faced a year of extraordinary disruption to its usual activities due the Corona virus pandemic which effectively shut down many walks of life for over a year including museums, galleries, and other venues where the public usually gathered. The Trustees embraced this year as a year of change and development and were particularly spurred on by the mandated activity of the 2019 AGM to overhaul its governance and constitutional model. A sub-committee of trustees met throughout the year to refresh all policies and practices in order to update and comply with charity law. Draft proposals were presented to members at the 2020 AGM.

Additionally, it was decided to move the 132nd Annual Exhibition to an online digital showcase and virtual gallery experience. From an initial call for entries, 347 entrants applied with over 624 artworks to choose from. 263 artists were selected to exhibit and 384 works were shown. PAI members made up 45% of entrants. The exhibition opened with live video presentations premiered on YouTube with speeches given by Liz Lochhead, former national poet; music by Grant McFarlane of Fèis Phàislig; and notes of welcome from some of the trustees. The exhibition ran the 25th July to 6th September 2020.

23 Prizes were awarded to a range of established and emerging artists. The exhibition featured a specially designed online virtual gallery experience, designed by a Berlin based Paisley man, Andrew Hopkins, and over the run it attracted 28,658 unique visitors from across the world. Sales of artwork were more modest, as a result of social lockdown, although 40 art works and 67 catalogues were sold earning almost £13,000.

Both the 131st and the 132nd exhibitions gained a good deal of media recognition with nearly 30,000 hits online from national papers such as the Herald and Daily Record, local radio and a large number of art periodicals and members journals. The charities social media presence grew massively during the year with followers/subscribers climbing to 4.7k and social reach of nearly 400,000 readers.

Financial Review

The Trustees' policy is to maintain sufficient reserves to cover a minimum of three months expenditure, excluding exhibition costs and artist payments. Exhibition costs are met from commission on exhibition painting sales and catalogue sales. Artist payments are only payable on exhibition sales completed and paid.

Grants Policy

The charity does not make grants. Awards are made annually on the basis of judging panel recommendations for various categories of art. Most of these awards are funded by sponsors.

Risk Statement

The trustees actively consider the risks to which the charity is exposed and where possible, and appropriate, take such actions as are necessary to mitigate those risks.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

It is the responsibility of the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and the results of the charity for that year. In preparing the financial statements the Trustees are required to:

select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently:

make judgement and estimates that are reasonable and prudent:

prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue its business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity which enable them to ascertain the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the constitution. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other regularities.

Independent Examiner's report

I report on the accounts of the Charity for the year ended 31 July 2020 which are set out on pages 8 to 13.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner
